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The statistical information disclosed in this report is obtained from the California Department of Education and the Barstow Unified School District. At the time of publication, this report met all SARC-related state and federal requirements, using the most current data available. Data to prepare the instructional materials and school facilities sections were acquired in 12/2008.

Principal's Message

Lenwood Elementary School's staff is committed to implementing an intensive, balanced, standards-based curriculum to ensure each child's success. This annual report card to the community will share valuable information about our instructional programs, academic achievements, school facilities and safety, highly qualified staff, textbooks, and finances compared to other schools and districts in the state.

A special emphasis is placed on providing an instructional program designed to boost student confidence and increase subject matter proficiency. Staff and parents work together to create a learning environment that has high expectations, promotes students' academic and social development, teaches responsibility and pride, and models learning as a lifelong adventure. We are excited about our school and its program and welcome all to support our efforts.

Mission Statement

The mission of Lenwood Elementary School is to provide every child with an opportunity to master grade level standards. Our goal is to create and maintain a safe and positive learning environment. Eighty-five percent of our students will achieve grade level proficiency in Language Arts and Math. The needs of those students not achieving grade level proficiency will be addressed through differentiated instruction and additional interventions. A safe learning climate will be maintained through the use of the adopted "Mustang Manners." The Program will be evaluated through weekly collaborative grade level meetings and the ongoing school leadership team meetings.

School Profile

Lenwood Elementary School is located in the western region of Barstow and serves students in grades kindergarten through four following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2007-08 school year, 350 students were enrolled, including 8% in special education, 27% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 82% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch. Lenwood Elementary School achieved a 2008 Academic Performance Index (API) score of 717 and did not meet all 2008 Adequate Yearly Progress criteria

Student Achievement

California English Language Development Test

State law requires schools to give the California English Language Development Test (CELDT) to students in grades kindergarten through twelve whose home language is not English. The test identifies new students as English learners, monitors their progress in learning English, and helps determine if they have achieved proficiency in the English language.

Standardized State Assessments

Students at Lenwood Elementary School participate in California's STAR examination each year. The mandatory STAR Program (Standardized Testing and Reporting) is a set of assessments that evaluates student proficiency in core subject areas and compares student results with those of other students in the state who took the same test. The STAR is comprised of the California Standards Tests (CST), Aprenda 3, and the California Alternative Performance Assessment (CAPA).

The CST aids in determining the level of individual proficiency required by the state. CAPA is administered to students with significant disabilities who are not able to take the CST. For more information on the STAR Program, please visit http://star.cde.ca.gov/.

California Standardized Tests (CST)

The California Standards Tests assess student performance on the California Academic Content Standards adopted by the State Board of Education. Performance standards identify the level of student mastery of the content standards tested. The state target for every student is to score at the Advanced or Proficient level.

The CST tables in this report illustrate the percentage of students achieving Proficient and Advanced levels. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the CST tables, no students met subgroup criteria. Academic Performance Index

California uses the results of STAR testing to calculate the Academic Performance Index (API) which is used to measure school performance, set academic growth targets, and monitor progress over time. The API is a numeric index between 200-1000 that measures student performance in grades two through eleven. An API score of 800 is the state's designated performance target for all schools. Test results are weighted and a formula is applied to determine API.

Growth Targets: For schools with an API under 800, the state requires a gain of 5% of the difference between the school's actual API and 800. Growth Targets apply not only schoolwide, but to each numerically significant subgroup as well. Schools/subgroups that have achieved an API of 800 or above must maintain their scores.

Statewide Rank: All schools in California are categorized according to type (elementary, middle, high) and are placed on a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the highest.

Similar Schools Rank: School performance is also compared to other similar schools in the state, based on demographic characteristics, and ranked 1 to 10 within a grouping of 100 schools.

Adequate Yearly Progress

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires that all students perform at or above the proficient level on the state's

standards-based assessment by the year 2014. Meeting Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) milestones helps determine whether students are reaching proficiency level targets set by NCLB. AYP requires annual evaluation and reporting of the academic progress of all students and defined student subgroups.

For the 2007-08 AYP cycle, elementary and middle schools must achieve a 35.2% or higher proficiency rate in English/Language Arts and 37% or higher proficiency rate in math on the California Standards Test (CST). Additional criteria contributing to whether or not a school demonstrates AYP include achieving a 95% or above participation rate on the CST and obtaining an API growth score of 620 or increasing the API growth by 1 point.

School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Lenwood Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1945; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Every morning before school begins, custodian inspect facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Lenwood Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Restroom
- Office Area Cleaning
- Classrooms Cleaning

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Restroom Cleanup
- Office Area Cleaning
- Classrooms Cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Deferred Maintenance

Lenwood Elementary School participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the 2007-08 school year, Lenwood Elementary School received a portion of \$369,198 in deferred maintenance funds.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the following individuals are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground: the principal, teachers, and noon supervisor. The principal and noon supervisors monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal, teachers, and noon supervisors monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Lenwood Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Lenwood Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual

harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed by school staff in April 2008 and updated in April 2008. Staff responsibilities and safety plan updates were discussed with staff in April 2008.

Classroom Environment

Instructional Time

All instructional time offered at Lenwood Elementary School either meets or exceeds California's Education Code requirements. For the 2007-08 school year, Lenwood Elementary School offered 180 days of instruction comprised of 140 regular days and 40 modified days. Modified days were used for parent conferences and professional development.

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Lenwood Elementary School's discipline policies are based upon Mustang Manners, which is used as a guide to develop school develop behavior management rules, programs, encourage positive choices in behavior, and minimize classroom disruptions. Teachers clearly identify and explain behavior expectations to their students and discuss consequences for poor or disruptive behavior in the classroom. Lenwood Elementary School employs a progressive approach in managing students who make poor choices in behavior, do not follow school rules, or are disruptive in the classroom.

At the beginning of the school year, school rules, disciplinary policies, and behavioral expectations are shared with students in the classroom by their teacher. Students are reminded throughout the school year of their individual responsibility to make good choices in behavior in morning announcements.

Administrators and teachers reinforce students demonstrating good citizenship, positive behavior, and student achievement on a daily basis. Lenwood Elementary School sponsors the following behavioral incentives: Student of the Week, Busy Bees, and Mighty Mustangs. Academic honors include Honor Roll, Math Awards, Science Awards, Language Awards, Top Readers, and Academic Achievement.

Extracurricular and enrichment programs held after school promote academic achievement and create increased interest in school. Lenwood Elementary School offers Homework Heroes, Game Room, and Girl Scouts.

Curriculum & Instruction

Staff Development

All training and curriculum development

activities at Lenwood Elementary School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. Professional development activities support adoption of new curriculum and implementation of new programs. Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. During the 2007-08 school year, Lenwood Elementary School held two (2) staff development days devoted to:

- Data analysis
- Instructional strategies
- Rosetta Stone
- Compass Learning
- Unwrapping Standards
- Student Discipline

Lenwood Elementary School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. Instructional aides are provided targeted training focused on teaching strategies and curriculum content. All staff are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences. Classified support staff receive job-related training from department supervisors and district representatives.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Lenwood Elementary School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, October 14, 2008, the Barstow Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution # 11--2008-2009 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to the core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instruction materials used for health, foreign language, and visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2008-09 school year, Barstow Unified School District certifies that each student, including English learners, enrolled in a health, foreign

language, and/or visual/performing arts class has been provided with a textbook or supplemental materials to use in class and to take home. These materials comply with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Leadership

The administrative team is comprised of the principal, who works closely with teachers, parents, and school staff. Principal Laura May is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the school and overall instructional program. Coordinating efforts with the principal is the Leadership Team, comprised of the principal, Program Specialists, and Grade Level Representatives. The Leadership Team meets monthly throughout the year to Set the agenda for staff meetings, school programs, and staff development activities

Principal Laura May has been in the educational field for 23 years and serving Lenwood Elementary School for 2 years (as of 2007-08). Previous positions held in other schools include: assistant principal and counselor. Principal Laura May holds a bachelor's degree in Home Economics and a master's degree in educational administration and supervision.

Specialized Instruction

All curriculum and instruction is aligned to the California State Content Standards and Frameworks approved by the State Board of Education. The instructional program is structured so that all students receive instruction appropriate to their learning level. Teachers use a variety of research-based instructional strategies and techniques using state-approved instructional materials to ensure academic success.

Students with special gifts and talents need more challenging curriculum and instruction. The Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program is offered to students in grades 3 through 4 who have been identified as academically gifted through Raven Assesments. Students receive differentiated instruction from class teacher. Instruction is provided by teachers who are GATE Trained.

For students whose primary language is not English and who have limited English proficiency, Lenwood Elementary School

offers programs to help them acquire English as quickly as possible and prepare them to meet the state's academic content standards. English learners receive small group and/or individualized instructional support in the classroom from bilingual aides collaborate with the student's teacher to provide support in areas of need. Some students may receive English Language Development instruction as a supplement to their regular language arts instruction. ELD instruction is provided in the classroom by home room teacher with bilingual aide support. Lenwood Elementary School's teachers utilize Hamptom Brown's Into English series, a state-approved reading intervention program and textbook adoption. Lenwood Elementary School's teachers monitor progress of English Learners continually and adjust individualized instruction to meet current learning levels.

Lenwood Elementary School's special education program is staffed by designated specialists. Instruction is provided in the least restrictive environment and based on each student's Individual Education Plan (IEP). Students have access to a comprehensive curriculum and are mainstreamed into the general education class with small group and individualized instruction in-class and in the resource room. The IEP team meets annually to establish goals and objectives, define academic instruction, evaluate effectiveness of the student's plan, and make instructional adjustments as necessary. Lenwood Elementary School takes advantage the district's participation in Desert/Mountain SELPA, which provide a pool of professional resources and expertise in the field of special education.

Lenwood Elementary School provides a variety of intervention and remediation programs to support students' efforts to achieve academic success and reach grade level expectations. Using STAR test results, district benchmark assessments, and exams, end-of-unit teachers and administrators can identify students who are struggling or performing below state proficiency grade level standards. For those students who need extra help in any subject area, a Student Study Team pulls together school and family resources to identify and develop strategies to help students improve academic and/or behavioral performance. Intervention strategies include:

- Excel Program
- Resource Specialist
- After School Tutoring

Supplementary instructional materials are purchased as needed to support intervention programs. Classroom teachers monitor student performance on district benchmark assessments, daily classwork, homework, and end-of-unit tests to measure ongoing academic progress and adjust instructional needs.

Professional Staff

Substitute Teachers

Lenwood Elementary School occasionally experiences difficulties finding substitute teachers to fill vacancies. On those occasions when a substitute teacher is not available, the absent teacher's class is separated and students are placed in a classroom of the same grade level to received instruction by a fully credentialed teacher.

Substitutes are available through a county pool that is comprised primarily of aspiring teachers, retirees, and teachers holding a 30-day substitute permit. Substitutes must have:

- A bachelor's degree
- Passed the CBEST (California Basic Education Skills Test)

Teacher Evaluations

Evaluation procedures and criteria for Lenwood Elementary School's teachers are defined in the district's collective bargaining agreement. Evaluation criteria are based on the California Standards of the Teaching Profession:

- Engaging and Supporting All Students in Learning
- Creating and Maintaining Effective Environments for Student Learning
- Understanding and Organizing Subject Matter for Student Learning
- Planning Instruction and Designing Learning Experiences for All Students
- Assessing Student Learning
- Developing as a Professional Educator

Temporary and probationary teachers are evaluated twice annually; permanent/tenured teachers are evaluated once every year. Tenured teachers whose previous evaluations either met or exceeded standards may be evaluated at least every five years if agreed upon by the teacher and school principal. Evaluations are conducted by the principal, who has been trained and certified to perform teacher evaluations.

Teachers whose evaluations do not meet specific evaluation criteria, as outlined in the collective bargaining agreement, are required to prepare an improvement plan in collaboration with the school administrator; teacher's evaluations are conducted annually until a satisfactory evaluation is obtained. Experienced and knowledgeable veteran teachers, referred to as Consulting Teachers, provide ongoing assistance to teachers who need to improve their instructional skills, classroom management strategies, subject knowledge, and/or related aspects of their teaching performance.

Counseling & Support Staff

Lenwood Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support

Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Lenwood Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

Teacher Assignment

During the 2007-08 school year, Lenwood Elementary School had 19 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. All of Lenwood Elementary School's teachers supplement their regular credential with a credential to teach English language learners.

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects.
