DRESS CODE

Clothing

1. Clothing must be neat and clean. Clothing must be seasonally appropriate, of proper fit, and in good repair as to not cause a safety hazard. Pant size must be appropriate. If the student removes the belt, pants must not fall more than two inches below the hipbone.
2. Clothing or accessories that suggest obscene gestures, pictures, wording (in any language), and/or are drug, tobacco, alcohol, or occult related are not permitted. Clothing or accessories that promote weapons or violence are not permitted.
3. BUSD school apparel such as T-shirts, sweatshirts, jackets and caps are permitted. Students are not to wear clothing designating membership in private clubs or representing gangs. Apparel representing community organizations may be worn upon approval of the school principal or designee.
4. Crop tops, clothing exposing bare midriffs, halter tops, plunging necklines, tube tops, open-sided shirts, skirts and shorts shorter than mid-thigh (finger-tip length), shirts, spaghetti straps, and blouses which expose sides of the body, tight stretch or Spandex pants (unless covered by outer wear clothing), and see-through or mesh materials which expose bare skin ARE NOT PERMITTED at school or during school sponsored events/activities. Tank top straps must be at least one inch wide. Outer clothing will properly cover all underwear. No garment may be worn that is cut-off, ragged or torn. Clothing must be worn right side out and have appropriate hems, exhibit no slits, tears, or holes, and must be in good condition.

Footwear

5. Safe footwear must be worn at all times. All shoes in elementary grades (K-6) must have backs or back straps. Socks must be worn with open toed-shoes. No "heellies" (shoes with wheels underneath) are allowed. Heel height for shoes in the elementary grades shall be no higher than 1 inch. No slippers or house shoes are allowed.

Headwear

6. Hats or caps are to be worn in an acceptable manner. Hats or caps may not be adorned in any way. Hats or caps may not be worn in the classroom or inside school buildings. Hoods (hoodies) that are attached to shirts/sweatshirts/jackets may not be worn in the classroom or inside school buildings. All other hats, caps, "dew rags," bandanas, or any kind of headscarf are not permitted.

### Accessories

7. Any apparel, jewelry, accessory, notebook, hair net, or manner of grooming which by virtue of its arrangement, trademark, or any other attribute denotes membership in or relationship to a group/gang (as identified by Barstow Police Department) which advocates or promotes drug use, disruptive behavior, violence or may be a potential safety hazard is not permitted. Accessories include but are not limited to: jewelry, personal items such as back packs, fanny packs, purses, book bags, gym bags, water bottles, lunch boxes, etc.
8. Sunglasses (unless prescription) may not be worn in classrooms or inside school buildings. Sunglasses are to be unmarked except for the student's proper name. Schools are not responsible if sunglasses are lost, stolen, or damaged.
9. Body rings/piercings, tongue studs, bracelets, large rings, dangling earrings, belt/wallet chains, studded chokers, belts or lanyards hanging from clothing or belt buckles which may be considered disruptive, a safety hazard, or used as a weapon are not permitted in the elementary grades. Stud earrings and hoop earrings no more than ½ inch in diameter are allowed to be worn in the ears. Jewelry that does not meet dress code requirements will be removed at the direction of the principal or designee.
10. Make-up, perfume, cologne, and false fingernails are not permitted in the elementary grades.
11. Tattoos are to be covered at the elementary grades.
12. Gloves may be worn during inclement weather only.

### Hairstyles

13. Hairstyles that are deemed a safety hazard or are disruptive to the educational process are not permitted. Extreme haircuts ("Mohawks" over one inch in height) or unnatural hair color are not permitted. Hairstyles that may fall and cover a student's eyes while in class or during school sponsored activities are not permitted.

### Additional Information

14. Meeting the requirements of Administrative Regulation 5132 (student dress) does not prohibit a student from adhering to the tenets of an established religion or faith as they relate to dress and grooming.
15. Anything not specifically covered in the above rules and regulations that is disruptive to the educational process or considered to pose a safety hazard will be at

the discretion of the school administration or designee with referral to Board Policy 5132 and Administrative Regulation 5132.

16. The state of California and the Barstow Unified School District Board of Trustees is also concerned about health issues related to safety. They include protection from sun damage to students. When out of doors, in sunny areas, students are encouraged to wear clothing including unadorned hats, caps, and sunglasses designed to protect students from sun damage. Sun screen lotion can be used by students during the school day without a physician's note or a prescription. (Education Code 35183.5)

Crestline Elementary and Barstow STEM Academy have a school-wide uniform policy and students attending these schools must adhere to the uniform requirements.

# BARSTOW JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

## DRESS CODE

The primary goal of Barstow Junior High School is to promote academic achievement. Any apparel which draws undue attention to the wearer or detracts from the educational process shall be considered inappropriate. In order to provide a safe, nurturing environment where students can learn, free from distractions, threats, intimidation, or harmful influence, Barstow Junior High School developed a dress code policy.

Anything not specifically covered in the rules and regulations that are disruptive to the educational process or considered to pose a safety hazard will be left to the discretion of the school administration or designee (see Board Policy 5132 and Administrative Regulation 5132).

All students shall abide by the following Dress Code guidelines:

### GENERAL

1. All clothing shall be within the bounds of decency and good taste as appropriate for school. Garments shall be sufficient to conceal undergarments at all times.
2. Hair and physical appearance shall be clean and neatly groomed. Clothing should be seasonably appropriate, of good fit, and in good repair. Aerosol cans of any kind are not permitted at school, i.e., hair color, hair spray. No excessive makeup is allowed.
3. Crude or vulgar printing or pictures depicting tobacco, drugs, alcoholic beverages, gang-related names or symbols, or those that are sexually suggestive are not allowed. Administration reserves the right to declare unacceptable any item of clothing, printing, or accessory depicting any logo that has been identified to be gang related.
4. Rips, tears or slits in clothing must not reveal undergarments or skin.
5. Excessively oversized or undersized clothing of any type or clothing of an inappropriate length is not acceptable. Administration reserves the right to determine compliance on an individual basis.

6. Barstow Unified School District School apparel such as T-shirts, sweatshirts, jackets, and caps are permitted. Students are not to wear clothing designating membership to private clubs or representing gangs. Apparel representing community organizations may be worn upon approval of the school principal or designee.

7. Any apparel, jewelry, accessory, notebook, hair net, or manner of grooming which by virtue of its arrangement, trademark, or any other attribute denotes membership in or relationship to a group/gang which advocates or promotes drug use alcohol use, tabaco use, disruptive behavior or may be a potential safety hazard are not permitted.

### TOPS

1. No "fish net" type of blouse, shirt or stockings may be worn. Students must wear shirts at all times. Fitted tank tops may be worn but must not reveal excessive skin or body parts, and must make a maximum effort to cover all undergarments. *Administration reserves the right to determine compliance on an individual basis.*

2. Clothing which exposes bare midriffs are not permitted. All halter tops, plunging neckline shirts, tube tops and non-fitted tank tops are not permitted.

### BOTTOMS

1. Dress/skirt/shorts length shall be within the bounds of decency and good ask appropriate for school. The length shall not be shorter than the end of the extended fingertips at all times. Garments shall be sufficient to conceal undergarments at all times.

2. Shorts must be hemmed and straight legged.

### ACCESSORIES (HATS, PIERCINGS, SHOES, TATTOOS, ETC.)

1. Nose, lip, eyebrow, or any other facial piercings (outside of ear rings) are not permitted. \*\*\*Covering one's piercing with a Band-Aid is NOT an acceptable remedy. These items are to be removed while on school grounds.

2. Shoes must be worn at all times. For safety purposes, *no open toed shoes, no heel over 2 inches, no slippers or house shoes* will be allowed on campus. Sandals must be held in place with heel strap. Steel-toed shoes and cleats are not permitted.
3. Barstow Unified School District principal approved school hats or caps may be worn in an acceptable manner. Other headgear is prohibited. No Hats, caps, "do-rags" and bandanas may be worn in the classroom or inside school buildings. All other hats, caps, "do-rags" and bandanas are not permitted. Barstow Unified School District allows students to wear sun-protective clothing, including but not limited to hats, for outdoor use during the school day (Education Code 35183.5 for outdoor use during the school day (Education Code 35183.5).
4. Beanies will be worn only in inclement weather/ otherwise, the beanie will be confiscated by school personnel.
5. Sunglasses (unless prescription) may not be worn on campus, in classrooms, or inside school buildings. The Barstow Unified School District and its agents are not responsible if sunglasses are lost, stolen, or damaged
6. Any finger rings, earrings or belt buckles which may be considered disruptive, a safety hazard, or used as a weapon are not permitted. **All body and facial piercings (except earrings), tongue studs, chains and studded chokers are not permitted.** Pacifiers are considered infant accessories and are not allowed on campus.
7. Tattoos will be covered at all times
8. Belts and Belt Buckles must be tasteful, unadorned and of an appropriate size for the student. Belts should be no longer than at allow 4" of surplus when pulled to fit the waist and shall not hang from the belt line.  
**INAPPROPRIATE/GANG-RELATED APPAREL (as determined by law enforcement and administration)**

Students wearing gang attire become targets for violence even though they are not gang members. In addition, the baggy, oversized clothing now identified as gang related, presents a safety hazard since it allows students to more readily conceal dangerous objects such as knives, and other weapons or provide hiding places for drugs and drug paraphernalia. Accordingly, the following types of clothing have been identified as unacceptable dress:

- Clothing, jewelry, and personal items that a student has including notebooks, folders, book covers, magazines, drawings, pictures, fanny packs, gym bags, water bottles, backpacks, or any other item that disrupts the instructional process.
- Hats other than unaltered school approved hats (properly worn)
- Oversized clothing such as shorts, pants, coats, etc. Pants or shorts must fit at the waist.
- Items that promote hate, intolerance or violence
- Unsafe jewelry and accessories, including but not limited to wallet chains, belts hanging from the waist, and belt buckles
- Visible undergarments
- Clothing with profanity, that is too tight, revealing or sexually provocative
- Clothing with pictures, insignia or brand names for controlled substances, tobacco, weapons, or alcohol
- Bandanas, *do-rags*, or *head gear that prevents clear view of the head or face*
- Unsafe footwear including house slippers. Additional footwear requirements may be imposed on students in specific classes such as: physical education, science and shop.
- "Skin" labels, #13 or #14 on belt buckles or shirts, athletic jerseys, and any additional articles of clothing or accessories if identified by administration or local law enforcement as being gang or hate group related will be forbidden on campus or any other school function or activity including sporting events.
- Gloves may be worn during inclement weather only. No single glove is to be worn at any time. No leather type gloves such as baseball gloves are to be worn at school.
- Beanies will be worn only in inclement weather. Otherwise, the beanie will be confiscated by school personnel. The 2<sup>nd</sup> instance will require the parent to pick up the beanie.

### COLORS

Students shall not wear clothing or apparel identified by school personnel as "colors." The term "colors" is defined as a display by the wearing or placement of apparel by a group of students, or an individual student, which could signify the membership or intent of membership in a student group known to advocate or participate in disruptive or illegal behavior.

Because gang-related symbols are constantly changing, definitions of gang-related apparel shall be reviewed at least once each semester and updated whenever related information is received.

## DRESS CODE VIOLATION PROCEDURES

Dress code violations are defined as those infractions that deal with inappropriate wearing of, or violation of the rules regarding pants, shirts, headwear, shoe wear and/or facial piercings. When a student is referred to the office for a dress code violation, the following procedure will be utilized.

### *Violation #1*

Student counseled about dress code regulations. Entry made in student's disciplinary file. Apparel taken from student, and the student told to pick it up in the office at the end of the day. The student may be directed to change clothing.

### *Violation #2*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the second time. Second entry made in disciplinary file. Student will be issued a one day After School Detention for failure to follow the valid authority of school officials. Student will be informed that a third violation will result in being assigned a Saturday School. Parent contacted and requested to bring a change of clothing, or pick the student up.

### *Violation #3*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the third time. Third entry is made in the disciplinary file. Student is assigned Saturday School. Parent contacted and informed their child has a third dress code violation. Parent informed that a fifth dress code violation WILL result in a one day, suspension.

### *Violation #4*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the fourth time. Fourth entry made in the disciplinary file. Student is assigned a second Saturday School. Student and parent informed that a fifth violation will result in a one-day home suspension for defiance.

### *Violation #5*

Student will receive a home suspension for a fifth violation. Every violation thereafter will result in a home suspension.

*BJHS understands that our families encounter circumstances that are outside of their control. Therefore BJHS will allow parent(s), the opportunity to reschedule (1) Saturday School per school year.*



Notice:

In an effort to work closely with the parents to ensure that your child is in class learning rather than waiting in the office, we have adopted the following policy:

If the student phones the parent to bring in a change of clothing, but the parent is unable to arrive within 15 minutes, the student will be required to change into loaners or their personal physical education uniform until the parent arrives. Students who refuse to change pending the arrival of their parent will be assigned After School Detention and not be allowed into class until dress code is appropriate.

## BARSTOW HIGH SCHOOL

### DRESS CODE

The primary goal of Barstow High School is to promote academic achievement. Any apparel which draws undue attention to the wearer or detracts from the educational process shall be considered inappropriate. In order to provide a safe, nurturing environment where students can learn, free from distractions, threats, intimidation, or harmful influence, Barstow High School developed a dress code policy.

*Anything not specifically covered in the rules and regulations that are disruptive to the educational process or considered to pose a safety hazard will be left to the discretion of the school administration or designee (see Board Policy 5132 and Administrative Regulation 5132).*

#### Student Dress and Grooming Code

A student who goes to school without proper attention having been given to personal cleanliness (including hygiene and body odor) or neatness of dress may be sent home to be properly prepared for school, or shall be required to prepare himself/herself for the schoolroom before entering.

In an effort to keep district schools and students free from threats or harmful influences and to promote a positive environment for learning, the following regulations are provided for parents/guardians, the following regulations are provided for parents/guardians, students and school staff to ensure appropriate school dress and grooming.

#### All students shall abide by the following Dress Code guidelines:

1. Garments shall be sufficient to conceal undergarments at all times.
2. Shoes must be worn at all times. *No house slippers or house shoes.* Steel-toed shoes and cleats are not permitted.
3. All hats, caps, "dew" rags, bandanas, or any kind of head scarf are not permitted. This includes fedoras and fishing hats.
4. Sunglasses (unless prescription) cannot be worn in classrooms or inside school buildings. Sunglasses are to be unmarked except for student's proper name. Schools are not responsible if sunglasses are lost, stolen, or damaged.
5. Any apparel, jewelry, accessory, notebook, hair net or manner of grooming which by virtue of its arrangement, trademark or any other attribute or behavior denotes

membership in or relationship to a group/gang which, advocates or promotes drug use or disruptive behavior or may be a potential safety hazard, are not permitted.

6. Finger rings, body rings, tongue studs, earrings or chains, belt buckles or clothing accessories which may be considered disruptive, a safety hazard or used as a weapon are not permitted. Pacifiers are considered infant accessories and are not allowed on campus.
7. Crop tops, clothing exposing bare midriffs, pajamas, halter tops, plunging necklines, tube tops, open-sided shirts, skirts and shorts shorter than mid-thigh (finger-tip length), shirts, and blouses which expose sides of the body, see-through or mesh materials which expose bare skin or undergarments ARE NOT PERMITTED at school or during school activities. Outer clothing will properly cover all underwear. Spaghetti straps or exposed bra straps are not permitted.
8. Apparel, hairstyle or makeup which are deemed a safety hazard or are disruptive to the educational process are not permitted.
9. Makeup, perfume, and false fingernails which cause a safety hazard or disruption are not permitted. Makeup of any kind is not permitted at the elementary schools without the permission of the principal or designee.
10. Tattoos will be covered if they promote any disruption to the educational program.
11. Meeting the requirements of Administrative Regulation 5132 (student dress) does not prohibit a student from adhering to the tenets of an established religion or faith as they relate to dress and grooming.
12. Lettering or printing will be allowed on shirts, sweatshirts, and other apparel as long as it is acceptable for school attire. Crude or vulgar printing or pictures depicting tobacco, drugs, alcoholic beverages, gang-related names or symbols, or those that are sexually suggestive are not allowed. Administration reserves the right to declare unacceptable any item of clothing, printing, or accessory depicting any logo that has been identified to be gang related.
13. Pant size must be appropriate. The fullness must not interfere with the normal school activities. If the student removes the belt, pants must not fall more than two inches below the hipbone. The crotch should not drop lower than the fingertips of the extended hand. The length of the pant should not extend past the heel of the shoe. When side seams are pulled out straight and then are crossed to the front, the edge of the pants should not cross the mid-point of the leg.

14. Dress length shall be within the bounds of decency and good taste as appropriate for school. Dress length shall not be shorter than mid-thigh. Garments shall be sufficient to conceal undergarments at all times. The length shall not be shorter than the end of the extended fingertips.
15. No garment may be worn that is cut-off, ragged or torn. Shredded jeans are permitted unless visible skin is showing above the mid-thigh (material must be sewn behind the opening).
16. No "see through" or "fish net" type of blouse or shirt may be worn. Students must wear shirts at all times. No muscle shirts, undershirts, or tank type undergarments are permitted. Tank tops may be worn but must not reveal excessive skin or body parts, and must at all times cover any and all undergarments. Administration reserves the right to determine compliance on an individual basis.
17. Clothing which exposes bare midriffs, shoulders, and/or under garments are not permitted. All halter tops, spaghetti-string shoulders, plunging neckline shirts are not permitted. Undergarment tank-type shirts are not to be worn as outer garments. Outer garment must cover all bare skin and under garments appropriately.
18. No gang-related apparel (as determined by administration). Refer to Gang-Related Apparel section for more detail.
19. Oversized clothing of any type or clothing of an inappropriate length is not acceptable. Clothing must be worn right side out and have appropriate hems, exhibit no slits, tears, or holes, and must be in good condition.
20. Belts and Belt Buckles must be plain, unadorned and of an appropriate size for the student. Belts should be no longer than allow 4" of surplus when pulled to fit the waist and shall not hang from the belt line.
21. Barstow Unified School District school apparel such as T-shirts, sweatshirts, and jackets are permitted. Students are not to wear clothing designating membership in private clubs or representing gangs. Apparel representing community organizations may be worn upon approval of the school principal or designee.
22. *Anything not specifically covered in the above rules and regulations that are disruptive to the educational process or considered to pose a safety hazard will be left to the discretion of the school administration or designee with referral to Board Policy 5132 and Administrative Regulation 5132.*

Students in violation of the dress and grooming code will be referred to the principal or designee. It will be the responsibility of all school employees and parents/guardians to enforce the code. This code will be reviewed annually by the committee composed of administrators, teachers, parents/guardians, and students and presented to the Board.

Information explaining the dress and grooming code will be made available to all parents/guardians and by utilizing the local newspaper prior to the opening of the new school year. Copies of this information will be distributed to all staff members and will be an agenda item at building level meetings. Copies of the dress and grooming code will also be given to newly enrolling students whenever they are enrolled.

### Wearing of Shorts

Students may be allowed to wear Bermuda shorts, walking shorts, or shorts of this type within the following guidelines:

1. The length of the shorts must be within the bounds of decency and in good taste as appropriate for school. The shorts length shall not be shorter than your fist when arms are extended.
2. Short shorts are not to be worn at school. Shorts that have pockets that extend beyond the hem line are considered a violation of dress code.
3. Shorts worn with knee socks are not permitted. Socks should be pulled down to expose at least 6" of skin.

Shorts that do not meet these criteria are not allowed.

### Gang-Related Apparel (as determined by administration)

Students wearing gang attire become targets for violence even though they are not gang members. In addition, the baggy, oversized clothing now identified as gang related, presents a safety hazard since it allows students to more readily conceal dangerous objects such as knives, and other weapons or provide hiding places for drugs and drug paraphernalia. Accordingly, the following types of clothing have been identified as unacceptable dress:

- Clothing, jewelry, and personal items that a student has including notebooks, folders, book covers, magazines, drawings, pictures, fanny packs, gym bags, water bottles, backpacks, or any other item that disrupts the instructional process.
- Hats
- Oversized clothing such as shorts, pants, coats, etc. Pants or shorts must fit at the waist.
- Items that promote hate, intolerance or violence
- Unsafe jewelry and accessories, including but not limited to wallet chains, belts hanging from the waist, and belt buckles
- Visible undergarments

- *Gloves may be worn during inclement weather only. No single glove is to be worn at anytime. No leather type gloves such as baseball gloves are to be worn at school.*

### Colors

Students shall not wear clothing or apparel identified by school personnel as "colors." The term "colors" is defined as a display by the wearing or placement of apparel by a group of students, or an individual student, which would signify the membership or intent of membership in a student group known to advocate or participate in disruptive or illegal behavior.

Because gang-related symbols are constantly changing, definitions of gang-related apparel shall be reviewed at least once each semester and updated whenever related information is received.

## DRESS CODE VIOLATION PROCEDURES

When a student is referred to the office for a dress code violation, the following procedure will be utilized.

### *Violation #1*

Student counseled about dress code regulations. Entry made in student's disciplinary file. Apparel taken from student, and the student told to pick it up in the office at the end of the day. The student may be directed to change clothing.

### *Violation #2*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the second time. Second entry made in disciplinary file. Student will be given an after school detention. Student informed that a third violation will result in being assigned a Saturday School. Apparel taken from student and kept until parent or guardian claims it. Parent contacted and requested to bring a change of clothing, or pick the student up.

### *Violation #3*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the third time. Third entry is made in the disciplinary file. Student is assigned Saturday School. Student informed that a fourth violation will result in a one-day In-school suspension for defiance. Parent contacted and informed their child has a third dress code violation. Parent informed that a fourth dress code violation WILL result in a one day in-school suspension.

### *Violation #4*

Student informed that he/she has violated the dress code for the fourth time. Fourth entry made in the disciplinary file. Student is placed in in-school suspension for one day for failure to follow the valid authority of school officials. Student and parent are informed that any further dress code violations may result in a more severe disciplinary action.

### **Notice:**

In an effort to work closely with the parents to ensure that your child is in class learning rather than waiting in the office, we have adopted the following policy:

If the student phones the parent to bring in a change of clothing, but the parent is unable to arrive within 15 minutes, the student will be required to change into loaners or their personal physical education uniform until the parent arrives. Students who refuse to change pending the arrival of their parent will be assigned In-school suspension and not be allowed into class until dress code is appropriate.

## Central High School Dress Code

Most students dress neatly and appropriately. They recognize that everyone feels more at ease when properly dressed and groomed. However, a small number bring disrepute to themselves and to this school by their standards of dress. Therefore, in order to maintain a positive image of Central High School and to reinforce the attitudes of most parents and students and pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title V, Section 320, the following dress policy has been adopted:

A pupil who goes to school without proper attention being given to personal cleanliness or neatness of dress may be sent home to be properly prepared for school, or shall be required to prepare himself/herself for the school before entering.

In an effort to keep district schools and students free from threats and/or harmful influences and to promote a positive environment for learning, the following guidelines are provided for parents, students, and school staff, to ensure appropriate standards of school dress and grooming are adhered to:

1. Hair and clothing must be neat and clean. Clothing shall be seasonally appropriate, of proper fit, and in good repair as to not cause a safety hazard.
2. Safe footwear must be worn at all times. **House slippers and flip-flops are not permitted.** Sandals must have a heel strap that is being used. No shoes with wheels are permitted.
3. Clothing and/or accessories that suggest obscene gestures, pictures, wording, and/or are drug, alcohol, or occult related are not permitted. **The administration reserves the right to judge material on its appropriateness.**
4. Students are not permitted to wear any type of clothing, accessories, or jewelry designating membership in private clubs. Apparel representing community organizations may be worn upon approval of the school principal or designee.
5. Hats worn by male or female students are not permitted in the building at any time. Do-rags or hair nets are not to be worn in the building at any time.
6. Sunglasses (unless prescription) are not to be worn anywhere on the head while in the building at any time.
7. Finger rings, body rings, bracelets, earrings, or chains which may be considered disruptive, a safety hazard, or used as a weapon are not permitted.
8. Crop tops, clothing exposing bare midriffs, halter tops, plunging necklines, tube tops, open-sided shirts, wife beaters, tank-tops, micro-mini skirts, short shorts, shirts and blouses which expose the sides of the body, tight stretch or Spandex pants (unless covered by outer wear clothing), and see-through or mesh materials, which expose bare skin, ARE NOT PERMITTED. **Outer clothing will properly cover all under garments at all times.**
9. Apparel, hairstyle, or make-up which is deemed disruptive to the educational process is not permitted. Hair may not be sprayed by any coloring that would drip when wet.
10. Tattoos will be covered if they promote or cause any disruption to the educational process such as promoting drugs, alcohol, or prejudicial hatred.
11. Makeup and perfume, which may cause a safety hazard due to an allergic reaction, are prohibited at school.
12. **Anything not specifically covered in the above guidelines that is disruptive to the educational process or considered to pose a safety hazard will be left to the discretion of the school principal or designee as per BUSD Board Policy 5132 or AR 5132.**

Students in violation of the dress and grooming code will be referred to the principal or designee. It will be the responsibility of all school employees and parents to enforce this code. This code will be reviewed annually by a committee composed of administrators, teachers, parents, and students and presented to the Board of Trustees.

### NON-COMPLIANCE OF DRESS CODE

Students who are unable to comply with the standards of conduct may be involved in one or more of the following actions designed to assist the student in developing acceptable behavioral patterns:

- Conference with student and/or parent
- Denial of school privileges
- Saturday School
- Suspension
- Removal from class
- Transfer to another school
- Referral to Student Attendance Review board
- Request for filing incorrigibility petition
- Request for voluntary withdrawal in lieu of recommendation for expulsion.
- Recommendation for expulsion

**Actions may be initiated at any level and may be repeated if the principal deems appropriate. Teachers may utilize some of the strategies listed above.**
